

Person-centered approaches to developing measures to counter child injury

The World Health Organisation (WHO) calls injury 'a major killer' of children. It is the 5th leading cause of childhood death worldwide, and 7th leading cause of disability. Over the last few decades there has been much progress in finding effective ways to prevent many of the different types of injury sustained by children, however a number of gaps in tangible solutions to minimising common types of injury remain. We have been exploring the use of person-centered approaches to intervention development to target a number of these residual child injury problems. In this talk I will present our progress in developing effective person-centred interventions to reduce injury to children in cars, and from falls within the home environment.
